IN WASHINGTON, 58 percent of children live in households where all available parents are currently working, and 23 percent of all Washington children are part of low-income families. It is widely agreed that the current early care and education system across states is woefully underfunded. The [cost of services](#) is out of reach for many working families, including those who earn middle-class wages.

At the same time, large swaths of early childhood teachers — even those with college degrees — earn unlivable wages. More than 19,750 members of the early childhood teaching workforce provide services to children in Washington.

Earnings by Occupation

- In 2017 the median wage for child care workers was \$12.32, **a 6% increase since 2015.**
- For preschool teachers the median wage was \$14.69, **a 7% increase since 2015.**
- For preschool or child care center directors, the median wage was \$22.17, **a 12% increase since 2015.**

*Total includes the following occupations as defined by the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics Occupational Employment Statistics (OES): "child care workers," "preschool teachers, excluding special education," "preschool teachers, special education," "education administrators: preschool/child care center programs". These data do not include the self-employed, although home-based child care assistants, who are employees, are likely included in the "child care worker" category. Due to the limited data available across states in the OES, state-based surveys or registries may provide more comprehensive estimates of the ECE workforce.
